### **National Consultation - Key findings**

- 98% of professionals and over 88% of people with lived experience support nationally defined rehabilitation pathways — including clear admission criteria, wait time expectations, and staffing standards — to end the postcode lottery in access to care.
- Only 54% of professionals believe SCI services are equitably accessible across the UK, while 79% of people with lived experience say equitable access to spinal injury centres is currently lacking — a clear indicator of regional disparities.
- 96% of both groups agree that access to housing, wheelchairs, and mental health services must be addressed in a national strategy — yet only 3% of people with SCI believe accessible housing is currently adequate.





## **Key findings**

- 93% of professionals and 99% of people with lived experience support mandatory, standardised training in SCI care across the NHS — a shared call to end inconsistent knowledge and care quality across regions.
- 94% of people with lived experience and 86% of professionals believe a national SCI strategy could significantly improve physical and mental health outcomes — a powerful consensus on the need for urgent, coordinated change.


